*Our Father, our King, remember Your compassion and suppress Your anger; remove
pestilence and sword, famine and wrongful imprisonment, destruction and iniquity,
plague and misfortune, all disease and obstruction, all persecution and baseless hatred,
from us and from all Your people of the covenant.*

These words are part of the extended Rosh Hashanah Musaf Amidah. They are inserted into the regular V'al Kulam paragraph, which speaks of our gratitude for God's blessings in our life. Here we add the Avinu Malkeinu paragraph which reminds us (and God) that we cannot take God's blessings for granted, and that our lives are held in the balance.
